link and she left re-enthused. Her grandfather had been a local police constable in North Devon.




Another local man learned much more about his family in an hour and was so pleased he booked in another session to continue the work.

South Zeal guided walk

Zeal, near Okehampton in May.

There has been a settlement at South Zeal since before Roman times, but in the midthirteenth century the site was designated a 'New Town', one of many established to take account of increasing population. The town's site was important, as it was on the main road through Devon to Cornwall . The new towns provided not only accommodation but facilities for trade. The properties were on burgage plots and resident craftsmen or tradesmen paid a rent for the right to live and work there. Others were tied to the land as serfs working for the local lord of the Manor. Some of these "new towns" survived and flourished but South Zeal did not. Today it is very much a community whose residents work away. But it still retains the original layout from the mid thirteenth century including the burgage plots on which the properties are situated.

After this splendid guide by their local history groups we retired to the Oxenham Arms (see photo) for refreshments and the landlord showed us around the mediaeval building. A large granite pillar in one of the lower rooms is a feature reputed to be many thousands of years old. If you hold your hand away from it you can feel heat being emitted from the stone. A fascinating building with a long and colourful history.

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Silk Embroidered Postcards

In our current exhibition "Echoes of the Great War" there are a number of examples of silk postcards which were bought as souvenirs by soldiers serving on the Western Front, two of which are shown here. They were hugely popular and it is estimated some 10 million of these postcards were made.

Novelty postcards crafted from card and silk first appeared around 1898, originating from France and Switzerland. Prior to the war convents around Belgium and northern France were used to embroidering church vestments and articles for sale to visitors. With the demand from soldiers for souvenirs the nuns organised refugee workers and local women to embroider these attractive but affordable items.

Identical designs were embroidered with coloured silk onto a starched strip of silk organza. Once embroidered they were sent to finishing factories for mass cutting and mounting onto cards. An embossed frame was secured over the top of each card and then trimmed.



They became very popular with soldiers billeted in foreign towns and sent home to convey their strong feelings of love, patriotism and for special occasions. There were three

main design groups: sentimental, patriotic, and military. The cards may have had a panel design, sometimes with a ribbon attached; a pocket design with a card or silk hanky inserted; or a panel design with photos of notable persons amongst flags.
