### **The Prayer Book Rebellion**



The Prayer Book Rebellion, was a popular uprising in Devon and Cornwall in June 1549, fuelled by resistance to the new, English-Language Book of Common Prayer.

Tony Gale will reflect on the 16<sup>th</sup> August 1549 when the royalist army stayed overnight in Crediton. They were pursuing the remnants of the rebel army crushed in a battle near Exeter. Thousands of defeated combatants had fled west as the royalists were hunting them down.

### The Roman Coin Hoard and what it tells us about Roman Devon

In November 2013, a metal detectorist found a hoard of 22,888 Roman coins near Seaton Down in Devon. It is by far the largest coin hoard found in Devon dating back to 350 AD.

Assistant Curator of the Royal Albert Memorial Museum of Exeter, Thomas Cadbury counted and categorised the coins and his talk tells us what we can learn about Roman Britain

**The Stone Circles of Northern Dartmoor**

Alan Endacott was born on a traditional Dartmoor Farm, founder Curator of The Dartmoor Museum of Country Life in Okehampton, former acting chairman of The Dartmoor Society and an archaeologist.

We will hear how Alan found Sittaford Stone Circle in 2007 and more recently, unearthed two more stone circles near Taw Marsh, Belstone and carried out excavations on them in 2024.



We will learn of Alan's theory of a "sacred ring" of stone circles around the central uplands of northern Dartmoor which challenges previous understandings of the Dartmoor circles as isolated monuments
